## CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

#### **Information from the State Superintendent**

Superintendent Barresi said on August 12, a one year extension request was filed with the United States Department of Education (USDE) of Oklahoma's flexibility waiver from the *Elementary and Secondary Education Act* (ESEA)-No Child Left Behind (NCLB). The waiver would relieve thirteen federal regulations and provide the latitude to decide how to best fund programs meeting student needs. If the waiver is rejected schools are required to set aside 20 percent of Title I funds for School Choice. The ESEA mandates that every student in a school must score proficient or require an exemption and the school will be labeled as failing. Approximately 90 percent of Oklahoma school sites will not meet the requirement. This would result in an increase of Priority Schools, currently 168 under the flexibility waiver, to more than 1,600 under NCLB.

The flexibility waiver granted Oklahoma the freedom to design programs to meet college and career ready standards. In order to retain the waiver USDE requires Oklahoma to prove our academic standards are college, career and citizen ready. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education were unable to determine if the Priority Academic Student Standards (PASS) met USDE requirements by the August 12 deadline. At this time we are waiting USDE response to the one year extension request.

Oklahoma ACT composite scores for the graduating class of 2014 dropped slightly and nationally there was a small increase in scores. The composition score declined from 20.8 in 2013 to 20.7 and national score increased to 21 from 20.9 over the same time period. Scores in three of the four subject test either declined or remained the same for Oklahoma students. In 2013, English scores dropped to 20.3 from 20.4 and mathematics to 19.9 from 20.1. Reading score improved to 21.5 up from 21.4 in 2013 and 21.2 in 2010, and science score remained unchanged at 20.9. Current 2014 graduate benchmarks scores revealed only 66 percent were ready for college freshman level English composition, 35 percent for college algebra, 45 percent for college social studies, and 25 percent for college biology. The other benchmark scores show more than ever that the academics standards we set for students are not where they should be and students not adequately prepared for success in our schools. We cannot continue accepting these results for our children and must demand solutions from district and state leader's for this generation of young people and generations to follow. As we write new English and math standards, keep a laser focus on increasing rigor and ensuring students are given a deep foundational knowledge of the subject matter being taught. Focus must be on content only and on the mastery of foundational skills is met.

Later on the agenda Dwight Pickering, Director, American Indian Education will present a new Oklahoma Indian Education Resource website. It is an innovative and comprehensive resource which is part of a larger effort to strengthen American Indian Education in Oklahoma. It details the vibrant culture, traditions, history, and government of the Oklahoma's 39 tribes. I commend Mr. Pickering for his work on this project as well as his work with the Oklahoma Advisory Council on Indian Education. It is critical that Oklahomans particularly the youngest and future generations understand and appreciate the legacies of our Indian tribes and the rich history they lend to the state. The online resource is a useful way for educators to ensure that happens.

The State Teacher of the Year (TOY) ceremony will be held at the State Fair of Oklahoma on September 16, 2014. Board Members are invited to attend.

## **Employee Service Recognitions**

Superintendent Barresi presented Janet Smith, Certification Specialist, Teacher Certification, with a 30 year certificate and service pin, and Keith Hicks, Director, Operations Support, with a 35 year certificate and pin. Superintendent Barresi thanked them for their faithful and dedicated service to the citizens of Oklahoma.

Superintendent Barresi recognized Nancy Hughes, Iona Martin, and Pam Honeysuckle, Financial Accounting Division, on receiving the USDE's Institute of Education Sciences National Center for Education Statistics Award for outstanding performance in timely and complete reporting of the National Public Education Financial Service.

Superintendent Barresi recognized and commended Jeff Smith, Executive Director, Teacher Certification and staff for their hard work in issuing 190 emergency certifications in the month of August.

#### **Qualified Zone Academy Bond Allocations Approved**

Nancy Hughes, Executive Director, OCAS, presented a request to authorize issuance of \$1 million to Haworth Public Schools from the QZAB allocation for renovations at the multipurpose gymnasium building to meet building code requirements.

#### **Report on the FY2015 Shared Superintendent Salary Assistance Applications**

Renée McWaters, Executive Director, State Aid, said the assistance program is in the third year and presented a report on the three shared superintendent contract/applications and six districts that included Wister/Fanshaw, Wayne/Byars and New Lima/Moss. State assistance can be provided for three consecutive years and up to \$150,000. The funds expended from the School Consolidation Assistance Fund totaled \$144,434.

#### **Report on the FY13 School District Audit Report**

Ms. Hughes presented a report summary on the financial performance of school districts through the school districts audits submitted to Financial Accounting that included Fiscal Year 2013 audit submissions from 549 schools and cooperatives; State Auditor and Inspector audits; December school districts audit determinations, deadlines, compliance; noncompliance and withheld federal and state payments; Local Board audit approvals, notarized Audit Acknowledgement verification and compliance timeline; SDE financial specialist reviewers and determinations of 547 audits; Oklahoma Cost Accounting System (OCAS) data procedures and requirements; and fiscal year 14 violations of revenue and expenditures.

Superintendent Barresi requested Ms. Hughes present recommendations for school districts and the support they may need to get a better agreement at the September 25, 2014 SBE meeting.

#### Payment of Late Federal Program Claims – Special Education, Federal Programs, 21<sup>st</sup> Century Approved

Anita Eccard, Director of Finance, Special Education, presented a request to pay federal claims to McCord and Wainwright school districts that did not file by the August 1 deadline.

# ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

# **Office of Instruction**

#### **Oklahoma Indian Education Resource Website**

Dwight Pickering, Director, American Indian Education and Lucyann Harjo, Norman Public Schools presented information pertaining to the new Oklahoma Indian Education Resource website. States throughout the nation have contacted the office interested in what Oklahoma has developed for the state's education system.

Ms. Harjo said she is a member of the Oklahoma Advisory Council on Indian Education and a Board member for the Oklahoma Council for Indian Education. A large group of educators and education participants were involved in working together to build and create the website resources for teachers. We are working with each of the 39 Tribal Sovereign Nations to develop a resource of accurate authentic information. The teacher resource link is available on the State Department of Education website. Ms. Harjo reviewed the tribal education guides, social studies standards, lesson plans and resources, Oklahoma Academic Standards, and lesson/resource submittal and approval.

## Formation of a Steering Committee to recommend to the State Board of Education a process by which new English Language Arts and Mathematics subject matter standards will be developed Approved

Board Member Baxter presented a proposal recommending the composition of a Steering Committee with a charter to establish the process and system to be used in English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematic standards; and to guide the process. The composition conforms to state law and is composed of one member of the State Board of Education who will Chair the Steering Committee. The State Board of Education has the ultimate approval authority for all actions regarding it and therefore two additional members of the State Board of Education will be on the Steering Committee. The Chancellor of Higher Education will serve or a designee, Secretary of Commerce or designee, State Board of Career and Technology Education will appoint one Department of Career and Technology Education employee; and State Board of Education will appoint one State Department of Education employee, one parent of an Oklahoma student in Common Education, one Superintendent of an Oklahoma Public School, one English Language Arts teacher, and one mathematics teacher.

In addition to include in the proposed recommendation is the establishment of an Executive Director position to be filled on a fulltime basis to work for the Steering Committee and State Board of Education as an advisor, administrator, guide and facilitator to ensure the standards are set and approved in a timely manner. A recommendation in regards to the Executive Director is that the person be a senior educator widely respected statewide. There are no names to offer at this time and would be a function of the Steering Committee to set. If a Steering Committee and Chair were to be established today they would be expected to report on the Steering Committee composition ultimately by the next State Board of Education meeting, and have the system on its way to implementation.

Board Member Baxter made a motion recommending the Steering Committee be established along with the position of Executive Director.

Board Member Ford said agenda item 9 (b) does not include the creation of the Executive Director. The motion needs to reflect how the agenda was posted.

Board Member Baxter said the Executive Director is a part of the Steering Committee. The motion on the agenda does not include the composition of the Steering Committee. It only establishes the Steering Committee.

Board Member Ford said the motion is to establish the Steering Committee.

Board Member Baxter said right.

Board Member Ford seconded the motion. To be clear this committee is examining the best process for the development of the standards, and not the committee that will develop the standards.

Board Member Price asked the appointment of Executive Director is a part of this motion?

Board Member Ford and Board Member Baxter said the appointment of the Executive Director will fall under the Steering Committee. The Executive Director is not separate from the Steering Committee. The Executive Director position and everything proposed will be presented to the State Board of Education for approval.

The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Shdeed, yes; General Baxter, yes; Ms. Franks, yes; Mr. Keating, yes; Mr. Price, yes; and Ms. Ford, yes.

#### Appointment of Three Members of the State Board of Education to serve on the Steering Committee formed to implement provisions of H.B. 3399 Approved

Board Member Shdeed made a motion to appoint Mrs. Amy Ford as Chairman of the Steering Committee and appoint to the Steering Committee General Lee Baxter and Mr. William "Bill" Price. Board Member Franks seconded the motion. The motion carried with the following votes: Ms. Ford, yes; Mr. Price, yes; Mr. Keating, yes; Ms. Franks, yes; General Baxter, yes; and Mr. Shdeed, yes.

## **Office of Educator Effectiveness**

#### Status of Implementation of the Teacher and Leader Effectiveness Evaluation System

Kerri White, Assistant State Superintendent, Office of Educator Effectiveness, presented an update on the Teacher and Leader Effectiveness (TLE), summer activity, questions and considerations regarding future of TLE. Ms. White reviewed the Educator Effectiveness Theory of Action guide, TLE components and goals.

#### **State Board of Education Gift and Donation Policy Approved**

Kimberly Richey, General Counsel, presented a proposed revision request of the gift and donation policy. The proposed policy revision will replace the policy adopted in 2011 with significant changes incorporating rules promulgated by the Oklahoma Ethics Commission. The State Board of Education is statutorily authorized to accept gifts and items of value on behalf of Oklahoma public schools under Title 70, Section 3-104.

Board Member Ford made a motion to approve the request. Board Member Franks seconded the motion. The motion carried with the following votes: Mr. Shdeed, yes; General Baxter, yes; Ms. Franks, yes; Mr. Keating, yes; Mr. Price, yes; and Ms. Ford, yes.

Board Member Baxter made a motion to adjourn and Board Member Ford seconded the motion. There being no further business Board Members unanimously agreed to adjourn the meeting at 2:48 p.m.
