#### STUDENT LEARNING & ACHIEVEMENT

#### Oklahoma Advisory Council on Indian Education (OACIE) Annual Report

Dr. Cindy Koss, Deputy Superintendent, and Student Learning & Achievement, said the Oklahoma Advisory Council on Indian Education (OACIE) and State Department of Education (SDE) partnership share the goal of providing equitable education opportunities for American Indian students. Oklahoma American Indian students represent 13.5 % of the approximate 130,000 student population. Dr. Koss introduced Council members Lucyann Harjo, Chairperson, OACIE and Julian Guerrero, Executive Director, SDE Indian Education.

Ms. Harjo presented the 2018 annual report of the OACIE, as required by the Oklahoma Advisory Council on Indian Education Act, on the effectiveness of Oklahoma public education system in meeting needs of Oklahoma American Indian students.

Ms. Harjo reviewed the OACIE six priorities, collaboration communication of education entities, improved inclusion of Oklahoma American Indian tribes, history and culture; Title VI student counts and funding types for Oklahoma Indian Education programs; Bureau of Indian Education (BIA) and state tribal schools and funds; Oklahoma and Tribal Nations student validations, cultures, impact and professional development provisions; Tribal/public school jurisdictions; update Oklahoma Tribal Consultation Guidance, ESSA engagement workshops, Tribal Nations/Title VI public school collaborations, partnerships, communication improvement; curriculum needs and improvements, Indian Education resource/website, social studies Academic Standards, teacher framework; Oklahoma federal grant funds; Tribal language revitalization, and course opportunities.

Ms. Harjo said the OACIE recommendations include producing sustainability plan for Fiscal Year 2021 to maintain staffing capacity for the Office of American Indian Education post grant efforts; provide additional teacher and administrator staff development through the Indian Education Curriculum frameworks; produce updated Tribal Consultation Guide to improve Tribal Nation and school district collaboration and communication and assist districts receiving Title program funds; encourage inclusion of more American Indian history and contemporary information in all state standards; and build continued effective partnerships, Tribal Nations and public school collaborations.

Board members discussed and asked questions inclusion of American Indian history, exposure, cultural collaborations; student performance; ESSA requirements, grant opportunities, equity taskforce, graduation rates, Tribal Education Department partnerships, and ICAP grant opportunities.

Mr. Guerrero, in response to Board member Flanagan's funding question, reported the Oklahoma Cost Accounting System (OCAS) code number 561 is the Title VI federal grant fund, and 563-Department of Interior Johnson O'Malley (JOM) programs.

#### FEDERAL PROGRAMS & FINANCE

### FY 2020 Shared Superintendent Salary Assistance Application reports

Monty Guthrie, Deputy Superintendent, Federal Programs & Finance, presented requests for shared superintendent salary assistance for the Keyes/Optima and Brushy/Moffett combined school districts. Applicants qualify for 50% funding salary or wage from the School Consolidation Assistance Fund and disbursed in quarterly installments.

Board members discussed and asked questions regarding student enrollment, School Consolidation Assistance Fund requirements/process; funding eligibility/determinations and state statutes.

Carolyn Thompson, Chief of Government Affairs/Deputy Chief of Staff, reported 5% of state lottery funds are allocated to the School Consolidation Assistance Fund; and reviewed state statute appropriation requirements and fund distributions to school districts.

Board member Flanagan motioned to approve the request. Board member Hernandez seconded the motion. The motion carried with the following votes: Ms. Monies, yes; Ms. Hernandez, yes; Mr. Flanagan, yes; Ms. Williams Bradley, yes; Mr. Bollenbach, yes; Mr. Bobek, yes; and Superintendent Hofmeister, yes.

## REPORT ON THE OKLAHOMA YOUTH ACADEMY CHARTER SCHOOL

Brad Clark, General Counsel, Legal Services/State Board of Education, advised board members on State Board of Education (SBE) charter school sponsorships and contractual agreements that incorporate performance frameworks for each school.

Melissa White, Director of Education and Superintendent, OYA said the academy was established in 2015 operated by the Office of Juvenile Affairs (OJA) and the first SBE sponsored charter school. Education is provided to juveniles in most secured environments under the direction of Steven Buck and governed by the OJA Board. Ms. White presented

an annual review on the governing body, OYA mission, finances, juvenile centers and campus updates; education staffing, course curriculum opportunities, ACT scores, testing comparisons, graduation statistics, ICAP implementation, dropout rate, and CareerTech input.

## REPORT ON THE LeMONDE INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL

Lance Seeright, Executive Director and Principal, LeMonde International School said the two-language immersion school has been in existence one year in Norman. Currently serving 202, prk-5<sup>th</sup> grade, students from the surrounding area of Moore, Noble Mid-Del and Oklahoma City. Mr. Seeright presented highlights of building public trust, celebrations of learning exhibitions, testing outcomes, growth levels, and professional development. Future goals include international baccalaureate, second language standards strategies/process, and assessments.

### REPORT ON THE ACADEMY OF SEMINOLE CHARTER SCHOOL

Wren Hawthorne, Head of School, said in 2018 the school opened with 30 students, grades 9 and 10, on the campus of Seminole State College. This school year opened with grades prek-11 at a new campus (the former American Legion Armory) and now accommodate 300 students. In 2020, prek-12 will be offered and a focus on early college high school programs.

Mr. Hawthorne reviewed enrollment growth, staffing, grant funds; elective courses, student organizations, tutoring, before/after care services; 2018 academic achievement/growth data, college prep participation, career/college explorations, student ethnicity/demographics/indicators, accrediting status, and FY2018-19 financial indicator.
