

Why is it important?

Research shows us that children whose families engage in literacy activities at home have higher reading achievement over time than children whose families do not.

How to support reading at home?

Encouraging at-home reading shouldn't be time consuming or challenging. Reach out to your local library for books. When reading, help your child to sound out words (decode), read with expression, stop at punctuation, and remember what they read (comprehension).

Do I read or have my child read?

Both! Reading out loud to your child is still valuable even as they start to read independently and you can even share the reading. When reading make sure to model good reading such as using a clear voice and stopping at punctuation.


