Why is this important?

Interactions and experiences vary for children and not everyone has the same background knowledge. When reading a story, children may not have the background knowledge necessary to comprehend what they are reading. For example, there may be vocabulary words or scenarios they encounter that are unfamiliar to them. If a story is about the circus, and the child has never heard of or been to a a circus, they would be unable to visualize a circus, and that would make it more difficult for them to comprehend what is being read. They may also be unfamiliar with the vocabulary being used such as 'acrobat'.

How can I help my child with this skill?

Before reading the story, discuss unfamiliar vocabulary and contexts with the child to build their background knowledge to better help them comprehend the story.

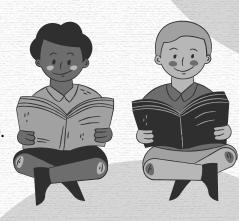

Conocimiento de fondo

¿Porque es esto importante? Las interacciones y experiencias varían para los niños y no todos tienen los mismos conocimientos previos. Al leer un cuento, es posible que los niños no tengan los conocimientos previos necesarios para comprender lo que están leyendo. Por ejemplo, es posible que encuentren palabras de vocabulario o escenarios que no les resulten familiares. Si una historia es sobre el circo, y el niño nunca ha oído hablar de un circo ni ha estado en él. no podría visualizar un circo, y eso le haría más difícil comprender lo que se está leyendo. También es posible que no estén familiarizados con el vocabulario que se utiliza, como "acróbata".

¿Cómo puedo ayudar a mi hijo con esta habilidad?

Antes de leer la historia, analice el vocabulario y los contextos desconocidos con el niño para desarrollar sus conocimientos previos y ayudarle a comprender mejor la historia.
