Texoma Autism and Behavior Intervention School (TABI) requests approval to participate in the Lindsey Nicole Henry (LNH) Scholarship for Students with Disabilities program. They are accredited through three highly regarded agencies recognized throughout the world. The North Central Association Commission on Accreditation and School Improvement (NCA CASI), the Northwest Accreditation Commission (NWAC), and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement (SACS CASI).

TABI is a non-profit school for children on the autism spectrum which opened in 2018. Each student receives instruction based on their own social, behavioral and academic level with specialized individual curriculum and therapy. TABI's staff utilizes Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) therapy. ABA can improve social, communication, and learning skills through positive reinforcement.

The Lindsey Nicole Henry (LNH) Scholarship Act requires, in part, that participating schools are located in Oklahoma and meet certain criteria prior to being approved. The school must provide supporting documentation that demonstrates compliance that will be reviewed by the State Board of Education (SBE) during the approval process. In many cases, the required documentation can be found in the school policies and/or school handbook.

The SBE shall approve a private school as eligible to participate in the scholarship program upon determination that the private school meets the following:

- 1. The private school must demonstrate fiscal soundness by having been in operation for one (1) year or providing the SBE with a statement by a certified public accountant confirming that the private school desiring to participate is insured and the owner or owners have sufficient capital or credit to operate the school for the upcoming year by serving the number of students anticipated with expected revenues from tuition and other sources that may be reasonably expected. In lieu of a statement, a surety bond or letter of credit for the amount equal to the scholarship funds for any quarter may be filed with the Oklahoma State Department of Education. *Proof of compliance required.*
- 2. The private school must comply with the antidiscrimination provision of 42 U.S.C. § 2000d. *Proof of compliance required.*
- 3. The private school must meet state and local health and safety laws and codes. *Proof of compliance required.*
- 4. The private school must be academically accountable to the parent or legal guardian for meeting the educational needs of the student. *Proof of compliance required*.

- 5. The private school must employ or contract with teachers who hold baccalaureate or higher degrees, or have at least three (3) years of teaching experience in public instruction in subjects taught. Proof of compliance required. A statement or excerpt from the school polices or handbook stating the educational requirement for the teaching staff is acceptable documentation.
- 6. The private school must comply with all state laws relating to general regulation of private schools and adhere to the tenets of all published disciplinary procedures prior to the expulsion of a scholarship student. *Proof of compliance required*.
- 7. The private school must meet the accreditation requirements set by the SBE or another accrediting association approved by the SBE. Submit proof of accreditation and list accreditation information in the box below.

8. The private school must be able to provide services and/or accommodations for students with disabilities. Please describe in detail the services, programs and support you offer to students with disabilities in the box below.

## Texoma Autism and Behavior Intervention School (TABI School) Articles of Incorporation

### ARTICLE I. NAME OF ORGANIZATION

### Texoma Autism and Behavior Intervention School

### ARTICLE II. CORPORATE PURPOSE

### Section 1. Nonprofit Purpose

.This corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code.

### Section 2. Specific Purpose

Texoma Autism and Behavior Intervention School provides education of persons with special needs, autism, and behavioral issues in a home school environment. The service includes academic education modification and presentation with the incorporation of the principles of Applied Behavior Analysis.

The specific objectives and purpose of this school shall be:

- a. To provide education of persons with special needs, autism, and behavioral issues in a home school environment.
- b. To provide facilities, curriculum and instruction using assessment tools to determine academic placement/ability for each individual enrolled in school.
- c. To provide opportunities for individuals to participate in the homeschool environment at a modified level most advantageous for social and academic success.
- d. To prepare student for public or private school readiness.

### ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the corporation shall consist of the members of the Board of Directors.

### Section 5. Non-voting Membership

The board shall have the authority to establish and define non-voting categories of membership.

### ARTICLE IV. MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

### Section 3. Insurance

The corporation may purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a member, director, officer, employee, or agent against any liability asserted against such person and incurred by such person in any such capacity or arising out of such person's status as such, whether or not the corporation would have the power or obligation to indemnify such person against such liability under this Article.

### ARTICLE XI. BOOKS AND RECORDS

The corporation shall keep complete books and records of account and minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Directors.

### ARTICLE XII. AMENDMENTS

### Section 1. Articles of Incorporation

The Articles may be amended in any manner at any regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors, provided that specific written notice of the proposed amendment of the Articles setting forth the proposed amendment or a summary of the changes to be effected thereby shall be given to each director at least three days in advance of such a meeting if delivered personally, by facsimile, or by e-mail or at least five days if delivered by mail. As required by the Articles, any amendment to Article III or Article VI of the Articles shall require the affirmative vote of all directors then in office. All other amendments of the Articles shall require the affirmative vote of an absolute majority of directors then in office.

### Section 2. Bylaws

The Board of Directors may amend these Bylaws by majority vote at any regular or special meeting. Written notice setting forth the proposed amendment or summary of the changes to be effected thereby shall be given to each director within the time and the manner provided for the giving of notice of meetings of directors.

### Health & Safety

### Nursing and Health

TABI School has a registered nurse that is onsite most days. Mrs. Rowlena Hartman serves in several capacities for TABI. Her licensure is available to view upon request. Mrs. Hartman also provides Healthy Habits training for all of our students.

TABI also ensures that 2-3 personnel are trained in CPR on a continuous cycle. All personnel are trained on bloodborne pathogens each year using the online training program available. Training certificates are kept on file.

(State Regulation 210:35-3-107).

### **Health Checks**

The health of your children is paramount. We regularly observe your children for obvious changes in behavior and how they are feeling. We will specifically watch for breathing difficulties, severe coughing, discharge from the nose or eyes, changes in skin color, bruising or swelling, cuts, sores or rashes and fevers. We will record our findings and speak with you about any concerns. Please inform us of any changes of sleep, eating, drinking, toileting habits, mood and behaviors at home. The school maintains first aid supplies in the office and each classroom for minor injuries. When the school cannot safely handle a student's illness, parents / guardians are contacted immediately. Student records must be kept up-to-date with current telephone numbers for home, work places, physicians and other emergency numbers. Parents / guardians, please notify TABI School of any changes that occur throughout the year.

and parents during the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., during the school session, or when class or any program established for students is in session.

### Safety and Emergency Preparedness

A wide range of emergencies may occur including weather related events, such as a tornado, as well as gas/chemical leaks, bomb threats or explosions, and hostile situations, such as an intruder with a gun or hostage situation. Considering each situation, we, at TABI School, have developed procedures for each threat. The detailed plan can be found in a binder in the school classroom.

### Fire Drills

Fire drills will be conducted a minimum of once per month. Due to the nature of some of our students, we will practice some "planned" drills to get the children accustomed to the expectations before an "unexpected" drill is performed.

Tornado drills are conducted early each spring.

### Other Emergencies

In case of need for evacuation TABI School will take children to the Love County Sheriff's Department. It is imperative that you keep your contact information up to date. We will take your child's enrollment information with us when we evacuate the building

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### ARTICLE IV. MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

Regular meetings of the members shall be held at least quarterly, at a time and place designated by the chair.

### Potty-training

For those students who are not potty-trained, TABI requests that you send pull-ups and additional clothes as we will begin the potty-training process when it is ascertained the child is ready. Once potty training has begun at school or home it is expected that both venues participate fully in the protocol chosen for that student. A hand-out of the protocol implemented by TABI will be given to the child's caregiver and the caregiver will be trained on the technique.

### **Grades and Progress Reports**

There will be a no formal report card as no grades will be awarded.

A quarterly progress report will be sent home to show progress towards grade level goals.

It is our policy to keep our parents informed as to how their students are doing through regular oral and written communication. Your student will have a binder that will go home at the end of each day. It will have the work they have accomplished along with any extra communication. Please return the folder daily.



### Parent / Teacher Conference

Conferences are always available. A minimum of a 24-hour notice is appreciated for scheduling. We will have a formal open house once per semester to speak with your student's teacher about his/her progress. For any additional conferences with your teacher or TABI School, please contact the director to make an appointment. If you have any questions about or concerns about policies and procedures, the director is available by appointment. We have also posted how to contact CPS abuse hotline and all necessary emergency contact phone numbers.

### Student Drop-Off/Pickup

All students will be signed in and out at the beginning and end of each day. Only persons authorized in writing will be allowed to pick up your student and ID will need to be presented.

### Student Expulsion

Texoma Autism and Behavior Intervention School serves an unique population of students and suspension or expulsion of a student is rare..

- A suspension can only last for up to ten days.
- An expulsion can last for up to one year.

If someone from the school thinks your child broke a serious school rule, they can ask the director to expel your child. In this case, the school will send you notice with a date for an expulsion hearing.

At the hearing, someone (called a *decision-maker*) will decide if the child will be expelled. The decision-maker will usually be

- · a neutral person from the community who doesn't work for the school, or
- a neutral hearing board of three or more members of the Board of Directors.

The decision to expel will be based on statements and reports from

- the school,
- the student, and
- witnesses who saw what happened.

### A witness can be

- · someone who saw what happened, or
- someone who knows your child well and can talk about your child's academic and disciplinary history.

Students in PreK through second grade (PreK-2) can only be expelled for very limited reasons (for example, having certain dangerous weapons or selling illegal drugs).

Students in grades PreK-8<sup>th</sup> must be referred for expulsion if they

- had a weapon on school grounds or at a school activity.
- · used a weapon to commit a crime on or off school grounds, or
- sold (or tried to sell) illegal drugs on or off school grounds.

Students in grades 3-8th might be referred for expulsion if they

- · broke a school rule on school grounds or at a school activity,
- were disruptive or put someone in danger on school grounds or at a school activity, or

• broke a school rule off school grounds in a way that prevents other students from learning.

Students PreK-8<sup>th</sup> grade who are exhibiting behaviors or academic difficulties that are felt to be beyond the scope, training, ability, and experience of TABI staff, may be referred for transfer to a facility/school that may more appropriately meet their needs. A conference with parents/guardians, TABI staff, (and student, if applicable) will be held to discuss options and explore resources.

### Criteria 6: State Laws & Disciplinary Procedures

### Texoma Autism and Behavior Intervention School Discipline Policy

When a student misbehaves:

1. Repeat the instructions and redirect.

If the student does not comply:

2. Repeat the instruction with the consequence

If the student still does not comply:

- 3. Administer consequence. If behavior is still disruptive after #1:
  - A. Bring student to sit with the TABI Director / designee.
  - B. Behavior Analyst will refer to behavior plan and inform parent of incident at Pick-up time.

### Consequences:

- 1. Time-out (Sit on a chair separated from the activity of the students in the classroom.)
- 2. During a "fun" activity or field trip time, the student will watch and not participate for a designated period of time: 3–8 minutes based on age (or social age).
- 3. Any additional consequences may be added to your student's behavior plan after a discussion with the student's teacher or the school director.

At no time will corporal punishment be sanctioned or utilized at Texoma Autism and Behavior Intervention School.

In the event of behavior requiring direct physical intervention, certified staff will utilize concepts of training through Behavior Development Solutions (QBS)
