WovenLife, Inc. requests approval to participate in the Lindsey Nicole Henry (LNH) Scholarship for Students with Disabilities program. They are accredited through AdvanceED, Oklahoma Private School Accreditation Commission (OPSAC), and the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC).

WovenLife offers a child development program for children ages birth through five-years-old with onsite speech, physical, and occupational therapy. The program was formally known as Easter Seals Oklahoma, Inc., however, in 2017 assumed the new name of WovenLife, Inc.

Included is compliance documentation that meets certain LNH criteria in the application.

The Lindsey Nicole Henry (LNH) Scholarship Act requires, in part, that participating schools are located in Oklahoma and meet certain criteria prior to being approved. The school must provide supporting documentation that demonstrates compliance that will be reviewed by the State Board of Education (SBE) during the approval process. In many cases, the required documentation can be found in the school policies and/or school handbook.

The SBE shall approve a private school as eligible to participate in the scholarship program upon determination that the private school meets the following:

- 1. The private school must demonstrate fiscal soundness by having been in operation for one (1) year or providing the SBE with a statement by a certified public accountant confirming that the private school desiring to participate is insured and the owner or owners have sufficient capital or credit to operate the school for the upcoming year by serving the number of students anticipated with expected revenues from tuition and other sources that may be reasonably expected. In lieu of a statement, a surety bond or letter of credit for the amount equal to the scholarship funds for any quarter may be filed with the Oklahoma State Department of Education. *Proof of compliance required.*
- 2. The private school must comply with the antidiscrimination provision of 42 U.S.C. § 2000d. *Proof of compliance required.*
- 3. The private school must meet state and local health and safety laws and codes. *Proof of compliance required.*
- 4. The private school must be academically accountable to the parent or legal guardian for meeting the educational needs of the student. *Proof of compliance required*.

- 5. The private school must employ or contract with teachers who hold baccalaureate or higher degrees, or have at least three (3) years of teaching experience in public instruction in subjects taught. Proof of compliance required. A statement or excerpt from the school polices or handbook stating the educational requirement for the teaching staff is acceptable documentation.
- 6. The private school must comply with all state laws relating to general regulation of private schools and adhere to the tenets of all published disciplinary procedures prior to the expulsion of a scholarship student. *Proof of compliance required*.
- 7. The private school must meet the accreditation requirements set by the SBE or another accrediting association approved by the SBE. *Submit proof of accreditation and list accreditation information in the box below.*

WovenLife is accredited through AdvancED, meeting the requirements set by the SBE. We are also accredited through NAEYC.

8. The private school must be able to provide services and/or accommodations for students with disabilities. Please describe in detail the services, programs and support you offer to students with disabilities in the box below.

WovenLife provides a Child Development Program (CDP) for children ages 0-5. The program includes ten classrooms (six classrooms are Early Head Start through a partnership with Sunbeam Family Services) and all classrooms are inclusive to children living with or without a disability. The CDP focuses on curriculum-based education, developmental and sensory growth, and serving children with on-site speech, physical, and occupational therapy. For all families, we provide a Parent Support Group, as well as many referral partnerships within the community to meet their needs. When needed, we have a contract Behavioral Specialist and School Counselor to help children and families. Staff receive hands on training and educate based on each child's needs. WovenLife's CDP currently has 30% of students living with a physical or intellectual disability.

The Child Development Program compliance file is located in the front lobby and can be viewed at any time.

Nondiscrimination Statement:

In compliance with federal, state law and U. S. Department of Agriculture policy, WovenLife is prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, or other protected classifications.

WovenLife provides an equal opportunity for individuals with disabilities to participate in the school's program and services by following policies and practices of inclusion, integration and reasonable modifications unless we are unable to accommodate in a particular case.

Parents are encouraged to contact the Director of Children's Services or the President & CEO with any concerns if they feel that they or their child have been subjected to or believe they have witnessed unlawful discrimination or harassment.

Confidentiality:

Information received from parents on enrollment forms is available to the administrative staff and the teachers who work directly with their child.

WovenLife employees respect the confidentiality of written, verbal, and observed information. Any information regarding an individual child is discussed with parents privately.

A parent is permitted to review records or medical logs containing information concerning their child upon written request made to the Director of Children's Services.

Visitation:

Parents are encouraged to participate in their child's program activities, including lunch, field trips and story time. Children enjoy sharing with their parents the activities of the day. Parents are viewed as active participants in their child's program at the school and are encouraged to visit often.

In rare instances, children find it difficult to transition from parent interaction back into the classroom routine. In these cases, parents are requested to establish a visitation schedule that meets their daily needs as well as their child's tolerance for parent visitation.

Reporting Child Abuse/Neglect:

Staff is required **by law** to report suspicions of child abuse or neglect to Child Protective Services. Every effort will be made to discuss the situation with families prior to making the report. Each year, staff receives training from Child Protective Services on recognizing signs of possible abuse or neglect.

Inclement Weather:

In the event of inclement weather, the school may be closed. WovenLife is concerned about the safety and well-being of all its clients and employees. At the same time, WovenLife is responsible for conducting quality programs and serving its clients. In adverse weather conditions, the President & CEO will determine whether to close the facility in conjunction with the Oklahoma City Public School System and/or the Oklahoma

In the case of a minor accident, the teacher will fill out an accident report with the details of the event. A copy of the report will be made available to the parent when the child is picked up. Although every effort is made to keep children safe, most children sustain a series of bumps, bruises and scrapes during the early years.

<u>Infection Control and Personal Hygiene:</u>

The Child Development Program uses the Good Health Handbook as its guidelines for health and safety issues. These standards were developed by the American Public Health Association and the American School of Pediatrics. Diapering procedures used in the School are those recommended by the Centers for Disease Control. Beginning with infants, children are encouraged to develop desirable habits of personal hygiene, including washing hands after toileting and diapering and before and after meals, brushing teeth, and eating a variety of nutritious foods. In addition to instructing children in these habits, teachers model the behaviors. A toothbrush (labeled with your child's name) is requested to help your child develop an awareness of proper dental hygiene.

Children's fingernails can be sharp and they also collect germs. For your child's health and safety, please keep nails closely trimmed.

developmental goals for children in the group, and the methods the teachers use for communication with parents.

Communication Between Home and School:

WovenLife will provide each family with a Friday folder that will be sent home on Friday of each week. Parents and teachers can share information about the child, and flyers or notices can be tucked inside. Teacher will send home the Weekly Planning Form so that parents are aware of weekly educational themes and specific daily activities. School staff can discuss any concerns with you. Notices for field trips, parent workshops or inservice training are included in the Friday folder. Home/School communication may also be maintained through telephone conversations and personal interaction. Parent/staff conferences are scheduled at least twice each year, and may be scheduled more frequently at the request of either parent or staff.

Discipline:

Most problems are avoided by keeping the children engaged in activities that are appropriately challenging and interesting, as well as by maintaining a predictable structure upon which the children can rely. Each classroom has clearly established and consistently reinforced rules regarding appropriate behavior. These rules are intended to ensure the child's safety and the safety of others within the classroom and the School, as well as to promote appropriate social development and relationships both with peers and with adults. Such roles may include taking turns, using words to express needs and wants, walking in the classroom and using materials safely and respecting the space and property of others.

The goal of discipline is to have the children be responsible for their own behavior. At no time is physical punishment or punishment related to food, naps, or use of bathrooms allowed. "Time Away" or "Calm Your Body" is used only when a child is hurting him/her self or others. "Calm Your Body" is used to help the child regain control of him/her self when other methods have failed. During this time, the child is seated in a designated area within the classroom and within sight and hearing of the staff and of the on-going classroom activities. Time Away are limited to not more than one minute per year of age. If a child consistently seems to require Time Away to control his or her behavior, a team meeting with the parents will be called to identify more appropriate and effective interventions.

If a child's behavior is such that she/he consistently displays hostile or aggressive behavior which is dangerous to self or others, and cannot be effectively managed in the classroom, the parents will be notified to pick the child up for the remainder of the day. WovenLife will not tolerate staff being hit, slapped, kicked or spit at. School staff will develop a plan of action with the family for a child that consistently and has been documented by the child's teacher that displays hostile, aggressive behaviors that is dangerous to self or others and cannot be effectively managed in the classroom.

In an effort to ensure the safety and well-being of all School children and staff, the following policy has been developed to address unacceptable and sometimes aggressive behavior. The policy is geared to involve parents throughout the process and to encourage a genuine collaborative effort to helping the child learn more appropriate and safer means of expressing him/herself.

1. The Director of Medical Rehabilitation will notify parent after one week of persistent inappropriate behavior. Teacher will document the inappropriate behavior.

- 2. Continuance of inappropriate behaviors over a two-week period will result in a mandatory parent meeting with staff within one week of notification.
- 3. A plan of action including a timeline for additional steps that may become necessary will be developed.
- 4. Non-compliance with the above procedures will result in dismissal from the School.

NOTE: While the program strives to serve all children, the School is also responsible for the safety of all students and staff. The School reserves the right to alter this policy in the event that a child's behavior results in the concern for the safety of students and staff.

Due to the nature of a few children's special needs, restraints may be used sometimes for therapeutic positioning only. At no time will restraints be used as a means of discipline or behavior control.

Nutrition:

Mealtime is a very important part of a child's daily routine. This includes assisting a child in learning to feed him/herself. Mealtimes are used as educational opportunities and social occasions. Breakfast is served between 8:00-8:45 Lunch 11:00-12:00 and afternoon snacks 2:30-3:30 are served daily. The School follows the USDA Child and Adult Food Program guidelines. All meals provided by the School are nutritional and prepared with attention to the appropriate type and textures of food for you child. Parents are invited to join their child for lunch in the classroom.

For children unable to eat the regular food served as part of the School's meal program, parents are required to provide a Doctor's note stating what modifications need to be made. A Meal Modification Policy Form will also need to be completed and signed by both the parent and Director of Children's Services stating all meal modifications.

If a parent prefers to bring food for their child we will follow all the following guidelines: food will be refrigerated unless it is deemed unnecessary by the parent. Parents will leave all food in the refrigerator and/or child's cubby each morning. It is the caregiver's responsibility to place the food in the appropriate storage area. All unused food will be discarded at the end of the day, unless the parent wishes to take it home.


Drinking water is offered to all children throughout the day.

The School participates in the USDA Child and Adult Food Program which is an agreement between the School and the USDA Child and Adult Food Program. We follow the guidelines of the USDA child and Adult Food Program and limit the amount of juice, sugar, sodium and saturated fats we serve. Each meal will meet all component and requirements of the USDA Child and Adult Food Program. The agreement states that we will meet USDA requirements in exchange for partial reimbursement of food cost, based on a blended rate calculated by family incomes of enrolled children.

USDA Menu Plan is as follows: Breakfast: Grain, Fruit, and Milk.

Lunch: Meat, Grain, Vegetable, Fruit and Milk.

Snack: Milk and Grain or Fruit or Vegetable or Meat
