As a professional teacher leader, she has helped students attain scholastic achievement through direct student led, instruction founded upon standards-based content. Her passion for equitable education manifests itself within her dissertation, which is focused around the topic of culturally relevant curricula and instruction.

Ofodile earned her BA in Communication and Media Studies from the University of Pittsburgh, MSA in Educational Leadership and Administration from Trinity University-Washington, and will receive her Doctorate of Education from Howard University in Education Policy this year.
