SUBJECT: Statutory Waiver Concerning Cooperative Agreements for Alternative Education

The following schools are requesting a statutory waiver of 70 O.S. 1210.568, which requires them to enter into a cooperative agreement with another school district if enrollment in their alternative education program is less than ten (10) students. Approval is recommended.

#### Section 915. Alternative Education Programs - Statewide System.

- A. Beginning with the first semester of the 1996-1997 school year, the State Board of Education shall implement a statewide system of alternative education programs which shall be phased-in within seven (7) years. The statewide system shall include but not be limited to Alternative Approaches grant programs, funded pursuant to Section 1210.561 of this title, and alternative academies or alternative programs implemented pursuant to this section.
- B. Beginning with the first semester of the 2002-2003 school year, all school districts of this state shall provide alternative education programs that conform to the requirements of statutes and rules applicable to alternative education. A program shall:
  - 1. Allow class sizes and student/teacher ratios which are conducive to effective learning for at-risk students;
  - 2. Incorporate appropriate structure, curriculum, and interaction and reinforcement strategies designed to provide effective instruction;
  - 3. Include an intake and screening process to determine eligibility of students;
  - 4. Demonstrate that teaching faculty are appropriately licensed or certified teachers;
  - 5. Demonstrate that teaching faculty have been selected on the basis of a record of successful work with atrisk students or personal and educational factors that qualify them for work with at-risk students;
  - 6. Reflect appropriate collaborative efforts with state agencies and local agencies serving youth;
  - 7. Provide courses that meet the academic curricula standards adopted by the State Board of Education and additional remedial courses;
  - 8. Offer individualized instruction;
  - 9. State clear and measurable program goals and objectives;
  - 10. Include counseling and social services components with the provision that providers of services are not required to be certified as school counselors;
  - 11. Require a plan leading to graduation be developed for each student in the program which will allow the student to participate in graduation exercises for the school district after meeting the requirements of the school district as specified in the individual graduation plan for that student; provided, for students who enter the ninth grade in or prior to the 2007-08 school year, the plan shall specifically address whether the student is required to meet the graduation requirements established in Section 11-103.6 of this title;
  - 12. Offer life skills instruction;
  - 13. Provide opportunities for arts education to students, including Artists in Residence programs coordinated with the Oklahoma Arts Council;
  - 14. Provide a proposed annual budget;
  - 15. Include an evaluation component including an annual written self-evaluation;
  - 16. Be appropriately designed to serve middle school, junior high school and secondary school students in grades six through twelve who are most at risk of not completing a high school education for a reason other than that identified in Section 13-101 of this title; and
  - 17. Allow students in the alternative education program, who otherwise meet all of the participation requirements, to participate in vocational programs and extracurricular activities, including but not limited to athletics, band, and clubs.
- C. The alternative education program of a school district shall be operational and serving students by September 15 of each school year.
- D. Each alternative education program of a school district shall receive funding based on the combined number of dropouts and students within the district who have been referred to a county juvenile service unit, a county juvenile bureau or who have been committed to the custody of the Office of Juvenile Affairs. Each alternative education program shall receive incentive funding as follows:
  - 1. For the first year of operation, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per student;

- 2. For the second year of operation, Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) per student; and
- 3. For the third year of operation and each year thereafter, Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) per student.


Statewide alternative education funding shall not be used to supplant existing school district resources or to support programs that do not meet all the criteria for the statewide alternative education system. No alternative education program shall receive less than a total of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per school year.

- E. By September 15 of each school year, all statewide alternative education funds received and expended for students participating in an alternative education program shall be reported to the State Department of Education by major object codes and by program classifications pursuant to the Oklahoma Cost Accounting System as adopted by the State Board of Education pursuant to Section 5-135 of this title.
- F. Elementary school districts, as defined in Section 5-103 of this title, may request a waiver from the State Board of Education from the requirements of this section to implement and provide an alternative education program. Any elementary school district that has not received funding pursuant to the provisions of subsection D of this section shall be automatically granted a waiver. If a school district is granted a waiver, no statewide alternative education funding shall be allocated to the district.
- G. 1. The State Board of Education shall contract for technical assistance for operation of an Alternative Education Technical Assistance Center. The technical assistance provider shall be an entity located in Oklahoma that has been officially recognized by the United States Department of Education to assess and facilitate dissemination of validated educational programs in Oklahoma. The technical assistance provider shall have priority, if its operations are deemed satisfactory by the State Board of Education and if funds are available, for annual renewal of the contract.
  - 2. The duties of the technical assistance provider shall include, but shall not be limited to:
    - a. providing initial and ongoing training of personnel who will educate at-risk populations through alternative education programs,
    - b. providing technical assistance to school districts to enhance the probability of success of their alternative education programs,
    - c. evaluating state-funded alternative education programs,
    - d. reporting to the State Board of Education the evaluation results of state-funded alternative education programs, and
    - e. providing in-depth program analysis and evaluation of state-funded alternative education programs.
  - 3. The State Board of Education shall not provide funding to an alternative education program that does not receive a recommendation for continued funding in the evaluation provided for in this subsection. Provided, any school district not receiving such a recommendation for continued funding may request a hearing before the Board with a review of the evaluation prior to the Board's final determination.
- H. All alternative education programs shall be subject to statutes and rules applicable to alternative education, including any exemptions from statutory or regulatory requirements authorized by statutes or rule.
- I. An alternative education program may be offered by an individual school district or may be offered jointly by school districts that have formed interlocal cooperative agreements pursuant to Section 5-117b of this title. Any school district submitting a plan for an alternative education program serving fewer than ten students shall enter into a cooperative agreement with another school district to jointly provide the program unless the program has been granted a waiver from this requirement by the State Board of Education.

- J. Any materials or equipment purchased by a school district with revenue received for students participating in an alternative education program shall be used only in or directly for the alternative education program offered by the district or any subsequent alternative education program offered to students enrolled in that district. Such materials and equipment shall be made available exclusively to alternative education students during the hours that the alternative education program is operating; provided, the material or equipment may be used for other purposes when the alternative education program is not operating.
- K. Upon implementation of this subsection as provided for in subsection M of this section and contingent upon the provision of appropriated funds designated for such purpose, all school districts in the state providing alternative education programs as required in subsection B of this section shall expand the programs to include middle-school-grade students. The program shall conform to the requirements of subsection B of this section.
- L. Upon implementation of this subsection as provided for in subsection M of this section and contingent upon the provision of appropriated funds designated for such purpose, each urban school district identified by the State Department of Education as having a high population of elementary grade students who are at-risk and in need of alternative education shall provide elementary level alternative education programs. The State Department of Education shall establish requirements for the programs. For purposes of this section, "urban school district" means a school district with an average daily membership of thirty thousand (30,000) or more.
- M. Implementation of subsections K and L of this section shall be delayed until the current expenditure per pupil in average daily attendance in public elementary and secondary schools in unadjusted dollars for the 1998-99 school year or any school year thereafter for Oklahoma, as reported by the National Center for Education Statistics annually in the Digest of Education Statistics, reaches at least ninety percent (90%) of the regional average expenditure for that same year, and funds are provided. For purposes of this subsection, the regional average expenditure shall consist of the current expenditure per pupil in average daily attendance in public elementary and secondary schools in unadjusted dollars for each of the following states: Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas, averaged together. By January 1 of each year, the State Board of Education shall report whether or not the ninety-percent expenditure level has been reached based on information reported annually in the Digest of Education Statistics by the National Center for Education Statistics. Subsections K and L of this section shall be implemented on July 1 after the first January 1 report verifies that the ninety-percent expenditure level has been reached and funds have been provided for the specific purposes of this section.

A. Reason for the Waiver request. Please include distance from your alternative education site to the closest possible district to coop with, what alternative means will have to be employed if your waiver was to be denied, and what percentage of your student population will benefit from the waiver if approved.

Chattanooga Public School is using Edgenuity for credit covery. This allows us to keep our students on campus. The mileage to the closest possible district to coop with is Grandfield which is 14 miles. Alternative means to be employed will be Edgenuity for the few students that we have that need credit recovery. The percentage of our student population that will benefit if the waiver is approved is approximately 5-10 percent.

B. List alternate strategies/plans which the district/site proposes, and how this plan will best serve the students of your district, i.e., a description of the educational benefits to the students, graduation rate if a waiver has been awarded prior to this year, and learning achievement.

We will serve our students through the Edgenuity program for credit recovery. This allows our students to be on campus in regular classes and attend Great Plains Career Tech if they choose. This allows our students to be a part of the school population on campus each day. This also provides them the chance to participate in extra-curricular activities. Our graduation rate should be in the 95%-100% range if the waiver is granted.

C. Have you participated in an alternative education coop previously? Have you been awarded this waiver before and what was the educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, impact of plan on other sites in the district.

We have not previously participated in a coop. We feel that our students will benefit from more face to face learning time with our teachers. Our students will be positively impacted by being in our learning environment every day.

  - Individual instruction--students are provided with individualized instruction that is designed to meet their unique needs.
  - Life skills--includend in the instruction plans for all Alt. Ed. students.

We have been awarded this waiver before. There has been minimal impact on our current students' performance levels due to the low enrollment size of the school and the number of students that qualify for Alt. Ed. services.

A. Reason for the Waiver request. Please include distance from your alternative education site to the closest possible district to coop with, what alternative means will have to be employed if your waiver was to be denied, and what percentage of your student population will benefit from the waiver if approved.

This type of program is needed to help meet the unique needs of a diverse group of students. The flexibility of this program allows students that do not reach success in the traditional brick and mortar setting to reach success in this non-traditional setting. Students that might not graduate have been able to do so with this program. If this waiver is denied, the only logical alternative will be for these students to enter into the regular education program, which has failed them in the past. If approved, 100% of participating students will benefit.

- \*\*We are a small rural school, so throughout the year our program will quite possibly serve fewer than ten students.\*\*
- B. List alternate strategies/plans which the district/site proposes, and how this plan will best serve the students of your district, i.e., a description of the educational benefits to the students, graduation rate if a waiver has been awarded prior to this year, and learning achievement.

All students are required to attend Alternative Education classes for a minimum of four hours and thirty minutes daily Monday through Thursday, from 8:00 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. This flexible schedule will allow students to work part-time throughout the week and also pick up an abbreviated class schedule at the regular school setting if that situation best meets their needs. This strategy would also allow students to attend a half day Career Tech program or pick up concurrent college classes if they meet mandated requirements. These education benefits will allow students the best opportunity for graduation success. For the 2021-2022 and 2020-2019 school years, 100% of eligible students have graduated. Hobart Public Schools' Alternative Education Plan is audited annually. The results vary from year to year with action and planning based on those findings.

C. Have you participated in an alternative education coop previously? Have you been awarded this waiver before and what was the educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, impact of plan on other sites in the district.

Hobart Public Schools has never participated in an Alternative Education Co-op plan; our waiver request has always been approved. This waiver has been approved in the past, benefiting both regular education and alternative education students. Our program allows students the opportunity to have their needs met and increase their performance levels.

D. Timeline: Please submit class schedule, calendars, assessment forms and other attachments as necessary.

The deregulation process would begin the first day of school (August 11, 2022) and would continue through the last day of school (May 11, 2023). Daily hours are Monday through Thursday, 8:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Students attending alternative education would follow the local school calendar (see attached).

E. Any financial impact to the District (positive or negative) for the proposed waiver/deregulation? If positive please describe where the available would be reallocated.

The deregulation would result in a financial savings to the Hobart district of approximately \$15,000 to \$18,000 per academic school year. The savings would allow Hobart Schools to purchase needed supplies such as textbooks, computer programs, additional teaching resources and daily use of electricity, air conditioning and general upkeep and maintenance of our buildings.

F. Describe method of assessment or evaluation of effectiveness of the plan both for staff and students, I.E., TLE, ACT scores, graduation rates, RSA, School Report Card, etc.

Staff members will be evaluated for effectiveness by TLE; student assessments will be delivered by an online teacher using Imagine Learning, LLC curriculum. Effectiveness will be measured by graduation rates, ACT scores and student progress.

- A. Reason for the Waiver request. Please include distance from your alternative education site to the closest possible district to coop with, what alternative means will have to be employed if your waiver was to be denied, and what percentage of your student population will benefit from the waiver if approved.
  - The current alternative education coop is 30 miles away. From 2016 to 2021 we had only one student show success at the coop. And only five students used the coop in that time frame. Last year we had alternative education on our site, and we were able to enroll10 students. Of those 10 students, one graduated, two are back on track with credits and want to go back to regular education, one earned enough credits to stay on track and wishes to stay in alternative education. Two other students made gains in earning credits and are close to being back on track to graduate in the four year time period. For our students an on site program is more successful than a coop.
- B. List alternate strategies/plans which the district/site proposes, and how this plan will best serve the students of your district, i.e., a description of the educational benefits to the students, graduation rate if a waiver has been awarded prior to this year, and learning achievement. For the 2021-2022 school year, we had two students enrolled who were current year seniors. One of them graduated and the other student came one day and did not return. We had one student who was a senior the previous year and needed additional credits to be able to receive a diploma. That student stayed until October and then decided to go to work. However, two students were able to gain enough credits to be classified as seniors next year, which will meet their expected graduation date. One student made enough gains to be able to stay classified at her expected grade level. And, two students made gains toward being able to be classified at their expected grade level.

C. Have you participated in an alternative education coop previously? Have you been awarded this waiver before and what was the educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, impact of plan on other sites in the district. Quapaw High School was awarded the waiver for the first time last year. For the school the impact is one less drop out for this school year. Two students who will likely graduate in 2022-2023 because they were able to gain credits to get them on track for four year graduation, and three additional students who are either on track for four year graduation or should be able to achieve being on track during the 202-2023 school year based on the past year's performance. In a small school being able to help six students graduate on time is a big impact to the school, but more importantly those are six students that will have better future opportunities because of our alternative education program.

Ε.	Any financial impact to the District (positive or negative) for the proposed waiver/deregulation? If positive please describe where the available would be reallocated. Last year we receive no financial state aid for our alternative education program. We will not receive enough this year to pay the teacher's salary and the online program used for instruction. So, for the district the financial impact is negative. Fortunately, we have a superintendent who believes the investment is worth a positive outcome for student learning.

Describe method of assessment or evaluation of effectiveness of the plan both for staff and students, I.E., TLE, ACT scores, graduation rates, RSA, School Report Card, etc. From a principal perspective, evaluation of effectiveness will be student graduation rates and learning growth. Learning growth will be measured using the online platform Edgenuity/Imagine Learning. The success of the program will be largely dependent on the effectiveness of the instructor; instructor effectiveness will be measured using the TLE. The school report card rating should be higher as students become more academically successful.

  - Big Pasture Public School is requesting a 3 year Statutory Waiver of 70.0Section 1210.568 for the Coop Agreement to serve fewer than ten (10) students in the Alternative Education Program. due to our small numbers of student enrollment, it is our belief most students needing this service would be better served in their home district, Big Pasture School.
  - The closest alternative education site to possibly coop with is approximately 35 miles away with the great Plains Technology Center in Lawton. If a student(s) 2-4% of our student body needs to attend Great Plains Technology center SCORE, then our district will COOP with the Technology center to better meet the needs of these identified student(s).
- B. List alternate strategies/plans which the district/site proposes, and how this plan will best serve the students of your district, i.e., a description of the educational benefits to the students, graduation rate if a waiver has been awarded prior to this year, and learning achievement. Big Pasture has maintained a positive path towards a 100% graduation rate of students who participated in the alternative program served in district. The district shall serve our students' needs by utilizing an online curriculum such as Edmentum on campus with the support of teachers on staff. The curriculum will allow the district to provide individualized scheduling and an individualized educational plan tailored to meet the needs of each student. The online curriculum, such as Edmentum, provides for the student flexibility to work at their own pace, at an accelerated pace if able, and allows for customized classes for credit recovery.
  - It would also give students the opportunity for individual counseling services to address their individual needs.
- C. Have you participated in an alternative education coop previously? Have you been awarded this waiver before and what was the educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, impact of plan on other sites in the district. Big Pasture School has been awarded this waiver previously. The success rate of students in the program is 100% earning their high school diploma. Currently we have two students attending Great Plains Technology Center in Lawton, Oklahoma and 1 students working in Big Pasture to complete graduation requirements.
  - By tailoring curriculum needs to the individual child allows for a positive impact on student success and program completion. By providing services locally, our school counselor is able to work with the child, parents, and family members to provide counseling services or assist in locating services to meet the emotional needs of the child. By addressing these needs, a potential student dropout may be avoided.

Our Alternative Education Program will be available during the school day. For individual students, adjustments in the hours of the regular school day will be made to meet their unique needs. In certain cases, students may be allowed to complete coursework on a homebound basis. Courses will be designed and implemented to be rigorous and meet all state requirements as designed. Each student will have support from district employees in order to achieve success.

E. Any financial impact to the District (positive or negative) for the proposed waiver/deregulation? If positive please describe where the available would be reallocated.

The Statutory Waiver may have a slightly positive financial impact on the district, if no students are identified as having a better success rate by attending Great Plains Technology Center SCORE program. The district will not have the obligation of transportation of students to the outlying district for Alternative Education Services and shall use the funds to defer part of the cost of the online curriculum. The most significant gain to the district is the safety factor. Not having the obligation of placing additional students on the road to another site, yet providing the educational services each student needs for success.

F. Describe method of assessment or evaluation of effectiveness of the plan both for staff and students, I.E., TLE, ACT scores, graduation rates, RSA, School Report Card, etc.

The program will be assessed by the success of each student who receives services through the program. Successfully completing the coursework and striving for successful ACT and state mandated test scores. Also, students achieving the ultimate goal of a high school diploma and the knowledge and skills needed to be an successful adult.

- A. Reason for the Waiver request. Please include distance from your alternative education site to the closest possible district to coop with, what alternative means will have to be employed if your waiver was to be denied, and what percentage of your student population will benefit from the waiver if approved.
  - Currently, no Maysville students attend the Wayne Alt. Ed. Coop that is within 10 miles from the high school. Our at-risk students do not have available transportation to attend a site in another town. Therefore, the district has elected to use a learning management system to provide the at-risk students access to complete coursework in a virtual format. This has allowed them to continued access to child nutrition, counseling services and school sanctioned events. With the low student population, an estimated 10% would ever qualify as a full-time alternative education student. The site principal with the assistance of the district's counselor will be responsible for identifying, assessing and

  - If the waiver is granted, at-risk students who qualify would benefit by electing an oline platform. They would continue to have access to tutoring sessions, child nutrition, and counseling programs to assist them and hopefully transition them back to regular education. The majority of students who qualified in the past for alt. ed. were credit deficient and not behavioral issues. Currently, credit deficient students are being served virtually because they can not travel to Wayne for alt. ed. This allows them to graduate on-time with their peers. So instead of send the alt. ed. funds to Wayne and have no Maysville students served; the district is asking for a waiver to keep the funds to provide an on-site alt. ed. program that consist of needed services and a virtual learning platform for instructional courses.
- C. Have you participated in an alternative education coop previously? Have you been awarded this waiver before and what was the educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, impact of plan on other sites in the district. We currently participate in the Wayne Alt. Ed. Coop. Over 10 years ago, our district was granted a waiver to conduct Alt. Ed. with fewer than 10 students. However, the program was designed as a full time alt. ed. program and the number of students being served dwindled below three. This did not justify the expense of an in-house full-time program. We request to cancel our participation with the Wayne Alt. Ed. Coop and serve our at-risk students virtually with the support of qualified educators within our district. Our students will continue to access all available in-house resources and the principal will closely monitor their academic and individual progress to ultimately graduate on-time.

D. Timeline: Please submit class schedule, calendars, assessment forms and other attachments as necessary.

Our students who would qualify as credit deficient would access online curriculum per the alt. ed. funding. Due to our small student population rarely is there a student who qualifies as a full-time alt. ed. student. But on the occasion a full-tie alt. ed. student was enrolled, their calendar will follow the districts calendar, their class schedule will be modified to follow the alt. ed. requirement of 4 hours 14 minutes. They will have a plan of study developed to ensure graduation is obtainable within the four year window if not sooner. They will have access to child nutrition, counseling and extra-curricular activities if they elect to do so.

E. Any financial impact to the District (positive or negative) for the proposed waiver/deregulation? If positive please describe where the available would be reallocated.

The current fiscal years allocation went directly to the Wayne Coop and no Maysville student benefited from those funds. An additional invoice was submitted for a remaining balance the district has for services not utilized. Being granted this waiver will keep the funds within the district and benefit Maysville students. Online curriculum will be funded by the alt. ed. allocation providing a positive impact on the district and all at-risk students being served.

F. Describe method of assessment or evaluation of effectiveness of the plan both for staff and students, I.E., TLE, ACT scores, graduation rates, RSA, School Report Card, etc.

Alt. Ed. students will be assessed by ACT scores and on-time graduation rates. Each student will have their own ICAP to monitor progress regularly. The staff responsible for supporting and providing instruction will be accessed using the TLE Tulsa model.

A. Reason for the Waiver request. While it is only approximately ten miles to the nearest coop (Woodward HS), we chose in SY 2020-21 to begin our own alternative education program. We felt we had more of a need than the two seats offered in the coop. We have identified that about 6% of our students (10 out of 159) in grades 9-12 have been identified as at-risk of not graduating from high school for various reasons. This is why we are requesting this waiver.

B. List alternate strategies/plans which the district/site proposes, and how this plan will best serve the students of your district, i.e., a description of the educational benefits to the students, graduation rate if a waiver has been awarded prior to this year, and learning achievement.

The students being served in our alternative education program will have the opportunity to come to school with a modified schedule. The ability to arrive later will give students a more viable chance of attending school. If they choose to arrive at first bell, they will be able to enroll in an elective class of their choosing to fulfill graduation requirements. Students will be allowed to participate in all extra-curricular activities and electives to ensure a more normal school setting. Students will participate in class activities such as senior picture trips, homecoming events and assemblies when possible. These students will have access to counselors more often than in a regular school setting and will be introduced to many life-skills through field trips to local and area businesses.

C. Have you participated in an alternative education coop previously? Have you been awarded this waiver before and what was the educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, impact of plan on other sites in the district.

The last year we sent students to a coop was during SY 2020. We had two seats at Woodward Public Schools Alternative Education Program. We received this waiver in SY 2021, but did not apply for it in SY 2022 as we began the school year with more than 10 students. We are applying for three years in case our numbers drop below 10.

	Creating an in-house alternative education program has added some financial strain to our school. We are currently paying a teacher to serve 8-10 students in the program and have for the past two school years. Even though this seems like a negative impact on our school financially, we feel that the positive outcomes of at-rish students being successful in school and eventually graduating outweigh the negative.

	Our alternative education teacher will still be observed using the TLE requirements. If alternative education students feel like their goals are to attend a trade school, college or university, we will provide them with the necessary tools to participate in the ACT test. We feel that assisting these at-risk students in as many ways as possiblie will only increase graduation rates and decrease the number of drop-outs.
