SUBJECT: Statutory Waiver Concerning Cooperative Agreements for Alternative Education

The following schools are requesting a statutory waiver of 70 O.S. 1210.568, which requires them to enter into a cooperative agreement with another school district if enrollment in their alternative education program is less than ten (10) students for the 2024-2025 school year. Approval is recommended.

Section 915. Alternative Education Programs - Statewide System.

- A. Beginning with the first semester of the 1996-1997 school year, the State Board of Education shall implement a statewide system of alternative education programs which shall be phased-in within seven (7) years. The statewide system shall include but not be limited to Alternative Approaches grant programs, funded pursuant to Section 1210.561 of this title, and alternative academies or alternative programs implemented pursuant to this section.
- B. Beginning with the first semester of the 2002-2003 school year, all school districts of this state shall provide alternative education programs that conform to the requirements of statutes and rules applicable to alternative education. A program shall:
 - 1. Allow class sizes and student/teacher ratios which are conducive to effective learning for at-risk students;
 - 2. Incorporate appropriate structure, curriculum, and interaction and reinforcement strategies designed to provide effective instruction;
 - 3. Include an intake and screening process to determine eligibility of students;
 - 4. Demonstrate that teaching faculty are appropriately licensed or certified teachers;
 - 5. Demonstrate that teaching faculty have been selected on the basis of a record of successful work with atrisk students or personal and educational factors that qualify them for work with at-risk students;
 - 6. Reflect appropriate collaborative efforts with state agencies and local agencies serving youth;
 - 7. Provide courses that meet the academic curricula standards adopted by the State Board of Education and additional remedial courses;
 - 8. Offer individualized instruction;
 - 9. State clear and measurable program goals and objectives;
 - 10. Include counseling and social services components with the provision that providers of services are not required to be certified as school counselors;
 - 11. Require a plan leading to graduation be developed for each student in the program which will allow the student to participate in graduation exercises for the school district after meeting the requirements of the school district as specified in the individual graduation plan for that student; provided, for students who enter the ninth grade in or prior to the 2007-08 school year, the plan shall specifically address whether the student is required to meet the graduation requirements established in Section 11-103.6 of this title;
 - 12. Offer life skills instruction;
 - 13. Provide opportunities for arts education to students, including Artists in Residence programs coordinated with the Oklahoma Arts Council;
 - 14. Provide a proposed annual budget;
 - 15. Include an evaluation component including an annual written self-evaluation;
 - 16. Be appropriately designed to serve middle school, junior high school and secondary school students in grades six through twelve who are most at risk of not completing a high school education for a reason other than that identified in Section 13-101 of this title; and
 - 17. Allow students in the alternative education program, who otherwise meet all of the participation requirements, to participate in vocational programs and extracurricular activities, including but not limited to athletics, band, and clubs.
- C. The alternative education program of a school district shall be operational and serving students by September 15 of each school year.
- D. Each alternative education program of a school district shall receive funding based on the combined number of dropouts and students within the district who have been referred to a county juvenile service unit, a county juvenile bureau or who have been committed to the custody of the Office of Juvenile Affairs. Each alternative education program shall receive incentive funding as follows:
 - 1. For the first year of operation, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per student;

- 2. For the second year of operation, Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) per student; and
- 3. For the third year of operation and each year thereafter, Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) per student.


Statewide alternative education funding shall not be used to supplant existing school district resources or to support programs that do not meet all the criteria for the statewide alternative education system. No alternative education program shall receive less than a total of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per school year.

- E. By September 15 of each school year, all statewide alternative education funds received and expended for students participating in an alternative education program shall be reported to the State Department of Education by major object codes and by program classifications pursuant to the Oklahoma Cost Accounting System as adopted by the State Board of Education pursuant to Section 5-135 of this title.
- F. Elementary school districts, as defined in Section 5-103 of this title, may request a waiver from the State Board of Education from the requirements of this section to implement and provide an alternative education program. Any elementary school district that has not received funding pursuant to the provisions of subsection D of this section shall be automatically granted a waiver. If a school district is granted a waiver, no statewide alternative education funding shall be allocated to the district.
- G. I. The State Board of Education shall contract for technical assistance for operation of an Alternative Education Technical Assistance Center. The technical assistance provider shall be an entity located in Oklahoma that has been officially recognized by the United States Department of Education to assess and facilitate dissemination of validated educational programs in Oklahoma. The technical assistance provider shall have priority, if its operations are deemed satisfactory by the State Board of Education and if funds are available, for annual renewal of the contract.
 - 2. The duties of the technical assistance provider shall include, but shall not be limited to:
 - a. providing initial and ongoing training of personnel who will educate at-risk populations through alternative education programs,
 - b. providing technical assistance to school districts to enhance the probability of success of their alternative education programs,
 - c. evaluating state-funded alternative education programs,
 - d. reporting to the State Board of Education the evaluation results of state-funded alternative education programs, and
 - e. providing in-depth program analysis and evaluation of state-funded alternative education programs.
 - 3. The State Board of Education shall not provide funding to an alternative education program that does not receive a recommendation for continued funding in the evaluation provided for in this subsection. Provided, any school district not receiving such a recommendation for continued funding may request a hearing before the Board with a review of the evaluation prior to the Board's final determination.
- H. All alternative education programs shall be subject to statutes and rules applicable to alternative education, including any exemptions from statutory or regulatory requirements authorized by statutes or rule.
- I. An alternative education program may be offered by an individual school district or may be offered jointly by school districts that have formed interlocal cooperative agreements pursuant to Section 5-117b of this title. Any school district submitting a plan for an alternative education program serving fewer than ten students shall enter into a cooperative agreement with another school district to jointly provide the program unless the program has been granted a waiver from this requirement by the State Board of Education.

- Any materials or equipment purchased by a school district with revenue received for students participating in an alternative education program shall be used only in or directly for the alternative education program offered by the district or any subsequent alternative education program offered to students enrolled in that district. Such materials and equipment shall be made available exclusively to alternative education students during the hours that the alternative education program is operating; provided, the material or equipment may be used for other purposes when the alternative education program is not operating.
- Upon implementation of this subsection as provided for in subsection M of this section and contingent upon K. the provision of appropriated funds designated for such purpose, all school districts in the state providing alternative education programs as required in subsection B of this section shall expand the programs to include middle-schoolgrade students. The program shall conform to the requirements of subsection B of this section.
- Upon implementation of this subsection as provided for in subsection M of this section and contingent upon L. the provision of appropriated funds designated for such purpose, each urban school district identified by the State Department of Education as having a high population of elementary grade students who are at-risk and in need of alternative education shall provide elementary level alternative education programs. The State Department of Education shall establish requirements for the programs. For purposes of this section, "urban school district" means a school district with an average daily membership of thirty thousand (30,000) or more.
- Implementation of subsections K and L of this section shall be delayed until the current expenditure per M. pupil in average daily attendance in public elementary and secondary schools in unadjusted dollars for the 1998-99 school year or any school year thereafter for Oklahoma, as reported by the National Center for Education Statistics annually in the Digest of Education Statistics, reaches at least ninety percent (90%) of the regional average expenditure for that same year, and funds are provided. For purposes of this subsection, the regional average expenditure shall consist of the current expenditure per pupil in average daily attendance in public elementary and secondary schools in unadjusted dollars for each of the following states: Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas, averaged together. By January 1 of each year, the State Board of Education shall report whether or not the ninety-percent expenditure level has been reached based on information reported annually in the Digest of Education Statistics by the National Center for Education Statistics. Subsections K and L of this section shall be implemented on July 1 after the first January 1 report verifies that the ninety-percent expenditure level has been reached and funds have been provided for the specific purposes of this section.

- A. Reason for the Waiver request. Please include distance from your alternative education site to the closest possible district to coop with, what alternative means will have to be employed if your waiver was to be denied, and what percentage of your student population will benefit from the waiver if approved.
 - The closest coop available to our district, The Choctaw Interlocal, is 30 miles away. Coleman Schools has a 0% graduation rate using that program; therefore, we requested a deregulation waiver to host our own students on our campus 4 years ago. Since then, we have successfully graduated several students. Our students utilize the Acellus software program to assist in credit recovery. This is the same program the Choctaw Interlocal uses. If approved, 15% of our students will benefit from this opportunity to receive alternative education on site in Coleman.
- B. List alternate strategies/plans which the district/site proposes, and how this plan will best serve the students of your district, i.e., a description of the educational benefits to the students, graduation rate if a waiver has been awarded prior to this year, and learning achievement. By students staying on our campus to receive the education needed for graduation, they can still continue to be a part of the student body, which allows them to grow socially and emotionally. It will also be easier and more accessible for these students to participate in extra-curriculars and receive hands-on insturction from educators they already know and trust. This will also eliminate a 30-minute drive to Durant (one hour round trip) each day, making it safer and much less of a hassle (or abstacle) for parents and/or students. This plan will help insure a higher success rate for our alternative education students.
- C. Have you participated in an alternative education coop previously? Have you been awarded this waiver before and what was the educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, impact of plan on other sites in the district. Before 2020, Coleman Schools was a part of a coop with The Choctaw Interlocal facility in Durant. In September of 2020, we requested a dereg waiver and was granted one for three years so that we can serve our students on site. Last fall, we requested another waiver (as the other expired) and we were granted a 1-year waiver. We have been very successful with our program to date and look forward to future years of success in our alternative education program.

D.	Timeline: Please submit class schedule, calendars, assessment forms and other attachments as necessary. Our alternative students have the same class scedule, calendars adnassessments as the regular student body. Class schedules and calendar are both attached.

Our little school is allotted a small amount of monies each year, but it is NOT enough to fund the program; however, we believe in the importance of this program and are willing to pay from our general fund revenue to do what is necessary to educate ALL children.

Describe method of assessment or evaluation of effectiveness of the plan both for staff and students, I.E., TLE, ACT scores, graduation rates, RSA, School Report Card, etc. Coleman's alternative education staff and administration will monitor the effectiveness of our plan through TLE observations, ACT scores, graduation rates, and continued success of our school report card.

Dear State Board of Education and Superintendent Walters,

Coleman Public Schools is requesting a three-year statutory waiver for our alternative education program for the following school years: 2024-25, 2025-26, and 2026-27 school years. Our rural school receives a very small portion of alternative education monies, but it is money we need to keep on the local district, rather than advancing to a Coop. We have been hosting our own alternative education program for the past four school years and seen tremendous impacts on student success, with a 100% graduation rate.

We serve less than 10 alternative education students per year as our total high school regular enrollment number is only 60 students. Keeping this small number of students on our campus to receive their education allows these incredible students to have the best "student-life experience" and ability to be a part of our school family. This will also allow them to have more accessibility to other extra-curricular activities on campus; therefore, we are requesting a deregulation waiver to serve these students on site, specifically state statute 70 O.S. § 1210.568, as well a request to abbreviate the alternative education day according to the administrative code of OAC 210:35-29-2.

Thank you for your consideration of this important request as we seek to best serve our students at Coleman Public Schools.

- A. Reason for the Deregulation request. Please include how your students would benefit from this deregulation, what alternative means will have to be employed, and negative effects on your alternative education population if your waiver was to be denied.
 Currently, we serve 8 students. These students do not function well in the regular classroom. We have seen improvement in attendance and grades with these students. The students have a bond with each other that they did not have in the regular classroom. Wildcat Academy is a home away from home with brothers and sisters at school.
- B. List alternate strategies/plans which the district/site proposes, and how this plan will best serve the students of your alternative education program, i.e., a description of the educational benefits to the students, graduation rate if a waiver has been awarded prior to this year, and the result of the previous years alternative education audit.
 Wildcat Academy students may enter the program through a teacher, counselor, or admirative approval. Once a application is filled out the application goes to the Wildcat Academy Committee for approval. Morrison is in the process of developing an MTSS program and once that is in place students will go through that process before entering Wildcat Academy.

C. Educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, and predicted graduation rate.
We have been the LEA for an alternative education coop previously. The program has helped meet the diverse needs of our students. It allows us to provide for their educational needs without neglecting the personal ones. This plan has also led to the success of our students in the other sites of the district.

 Our district is negatively impacted financially. This year a teacher was hired to have the Wildcat Academy compartmentalized in one room, with a burden put upon the school. Some students attend Meridian Tech, Athletics, and e-Sports with regular ed teachers. The money we receive does not cover the entire cost of the Wildcat Academy teacher, but our district feels that the cost is more important than student failure.

Describe method of assessment or evaluation of effectiveness of the plan both for staff and students, I.E., TLE, ACT scores, graduation rates, RSA, School Report Card, etc. We use the TLE, ACT scores, graduation rates, RSA, School Report Card, etc. We use the TLE for the evaluation of the teachers. We use ACT scores, graduation rate, credit recovery percentages, effectiveness surveys and administrative review to assess the effectiveness of the plan for students and staff.

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- A. Reason for the Deregulation request. Please include how your students would benefit from this deregulation, what alternative means will have to be employed, and negative effects on your alternative education population if your waiver was to be denied.
 The current alternative education coop is 30 miles away. From 2016 to 2021, we had only 1 student show success at the coop. During that same time frame, only 5 students used the coop to complete their education requirements. This past school year, we had 10 students enrolled in alternative education. Of those, 7 have maintained their studies for the entire year (the others moved out of district). One of our current students will graduate with the class of 2024. Having an onsite location has allowed us the flexibility to service students who otherwise would not have been successful in a traditional setting.
- B. List alternate strategies/plans which the district/site proposes, and how this plan will best serve the students of your alternative education program, i.e., a description of the educational benefits to the students, graduation rate if a waiver has been awarded prior to this year, and the result of the previous years alternative education audit.
 With our onsite program, we have been able to accommodate our students because they can ride school transportation to and from school. When we used the coop, students were not able to ride the bus due to scheduling conflicts. Having an onsite program has allowed us to have more students participate in an alternative method of instruction, thus creating an avenue to graduation they may not have otherwise had.

Our 2023-24 alternative education audit was good, and we had no deficiencies. As part of our program, we are incorporating a variety of off-site learning opportunities. Our students have participated in countless volunteer service hours, taken tours of an art museum, and have had opportunities to practice life skills in real-world settings.

C. Educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, and predicted graduation rate.

The 2023-24 school year was the third year for Quapaw to have an onsite alternative education program. Since its inception, we have had four students graduate, and three who caught up on credits and returned to regular classes. Currently there are 7 working on credit recovery to earn regular credits. In such a small school, being able to help these students catch up to meet graduation requirements is a big impact for the district.

D. Timeline: Please submit class schedule, calendars, assessment forms and other attachments as necessary, or described in instructions. A waiver/deregulation can be granted for up to 3 years. (Please see instructions for additional requirements) Please see attachments for 2024-25 calendar and class schedule.

Assessments for each subject are completed via Edgenuity, and are student specific. Once their grade is computed from Edgenuity, it is transcribed into our student information system (Sylogist).

- E. Any financial impact to the District (positive or negative) for the proposed waiver/deregulation? If positive please describe where the available would be reallocated. In its first year, the alternative education program received no funding. Last year, the funding as approximately \$14,000 from the state, and this year's funding was approximately \$11,000. We supplement this cost with federal funds to help cover the cost of employing a full-time teacher for the program. The digital platform used for lesson delivery has a cost of around \$8,000, and the additional expenses of teacher salary plus Chromebooks for students puts the district in a deficit for the program. However, our administratioon feels the investment of meeting these students' educational goals far exceeds the cost.
- F. Describe method of assessment or evaluation of effectiveness of the plan both for staff and students, i.E., TLE, ACT scores, graduation rates, RSA, School Report Card, etc.

 From an administration perspective, evaluation of effectiveness will be graduation rates and learning growth. Learning progress and growth will be measured using an online platorm, Edgenuity/Imagine Learning. The success of this program will be largely dependent upon the effectiveness of the instructor, while instructor effectiveness will be measured via the TLE model. The school report card rating should improve as these students achieve academic successes. As we graduate 1 student from the program in 2024, and plan to graduate an additional 2-3 additional students in 2024-25, this program speaks for itself in the effectiveness in offering different avenues for students to successfully complete graduation requirements.



 - The low number of students in our District Needs Assessment indicates we would have a minimal number of students, if any, who need alternative placement. We have been on an alternative education waiver for the past three years. We utilize benchmark testing for all students grades K-11 using NWEA to monitor student progress and implement intervention strategies if needed. ACT and NWEA data are analyzed by teachers and administration quarterly. We have an additional part time counselor who will be available to assist in meeting the students' social-emotional and academic needs. Our graduation rate over the previous three years is 96%. The vast majority of those dropouts have been ones that moved out-of-state.
- C. Educational impact to the district: Results of the Statutory Waiver, i.e., effect on student performance levels, and predicted graduation rate.
 - Yes, Hooker Public Schools has previously participated in an alternative education coop. We have used the waiver for the past three years. During that three year period, we have implemented benchmark testing using the NWEA. Using the NWEA data, we have been able to implement interventions for students reducing our class failure rate drastically. Over the past three years, there was not a need for an alternative education program. Our graduation rate for this year is 97%.


