Waiver-Flexibility of Allocated Textbook Funds

The following schools are requesting a statutory waiver of 70 O.S. § 16-114a. A school district seeking flexibility in the use of state-appropriated funding allocated pursuant to this section for textbooks shall be required to demonstrate to the State Board of Education (the "Board") that the textbooks and instructional materials used by the district for the subject areas being considered in the current textbook adoption cycle are current and appropriate for student learning. Subject to the provisions of subsection E of Section 16-111 of this title, a school district that has received textbook funding flexibility approval from the Board may elect to expend any monies allocated pursuant to this section for textbooks, including any monies carried over as authorized pursuant to subsection A of this section, for any purpose related to the support and maintenance of the school district as determined by the board of education of the school district.



Needs assessment of current literacy programs at all Central Oak Elementary reveals a pressing need for additional intervention for struggling readers and English Language Learners. Campus leaders and teachers report an urgent need for additional strategies, and resources for intervention. To address this need Crooked Oak began implementing a dual language program for Preschool and Kindergarten students and is looking to expand it through third grade.

Quantitative measures of implementation include student literacy assessment results, standards-based grade reporting, reading records, writing samples, and intervention data. Qualitative measures include teacher, student, and family surveys (as appropriate), classroom observation (TLE), dialogue and feedback from teacher collaboration, focus groups, Parent/Teacher Conferences, and vertical teams.

Student assessment, both formative and summative, is necessary in measuring literacy progress and designing interventions and enrichment based upon individual students' strengths and needs. Assessment results will be used to determine the curriculum effectiveness in addition to drive literacy instruction for individual students and serve as a guide for campus literacy interventions and classroom instruction.
