Strategy: Dual Credit/Concurrent Enrollment

Increasing College Readiness

Execution on the mission starts with a commitment by the adults in the district that <u>every</u> child deserves to be "coached up" for college/career.

- Grade level principals and counselors "loop" with students across grade levels to ensure relationship building and accountability.
- Secondary Academic Counselors are available year-round to assist students and parents.
- College and Career Counselors begin preparing middle school students for post-secondary plans.
- EXCELerate Pilot program encourages success by eliminating barriers to concurrent courses via TCC.
- Course "pathways" ensure an articulated curriculum.
- Collegiate atmosphere and "gradual release of responsibility" build skills for success after high school.

STUDENT:


- 2010-16: \$12.75 fee for 3 hour course
- 2017- : \$35.75 fee for 3 hour course (if students qualify for free/reduced lunch)
- 2017- : \$90.00 fee for 3 hour course (if students are not on free/reduced lunch)

DISTRICT:

- Bond funds purchase collegiate textbooks/calculators/online resources.
- Classes are held on UHS campus to eliminate transportation barrier.
- Tiered lecture halls/classrooms were built in new Union Collegiate Academy (UCA) to provide a collegiate-like experience.
- "Student Union" atmosphere was created by eliminating a single cafeteria and creating eight unique restaurants and a cyber café.
- Soft-seating areas, collaborative spaces, and Wi-Fi mimic a college setting.

TCC:

- Provides instructors for concurrent courses
- Co-administers the EXCELerate program



Early College High School (ECHS)



- With Regents' approval, Union Public Schools and Tulsa Community College will collaborate to offer the opportunity for Union students to simultaneously earn an associate degree and a high school diploma.
- All courses will be taught on the UHS Campus; currently, all instructors are from TCC.
- Pilot year cohort: 60 current 9th graders (Class of 2021)
- Focus: students from underrepresented populations who would be the first in their family to graduate from college
- **Plan of study:** college prep strategies taught in 9th grade, a "summer bridge" program, and college courses beginning in the sophomore year.
- Cost to students: free


- Planning Partner: Teaching Institute for Excellence in STEM (TIES)

Collaborative partners: PLTW and the Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Foundation


- Since 2007, PLTW Engineering and Biomed courses have been offered for a select group of 9th-12 graders through Tulsa Technology Center.
- The first Gateway engineering course debuted at Union 8th Grade Center in 2012
- Launch curriculum piloted at Darnaby Elementary for all K-5th students in 2013-14
- By 2016-17, all elementary schools offered Launch to all students.
- Today, we have fully articulated pathways in Grades 6-12 for Engineering, Biomed, & Computer Science.

K-12 PLTW STUDENT ENROLLMENT ACTUAL & PROJECTED




2016-2017 PLTW K-12 ENROLLMENT

Goal: Career Readiness

Strategy: Career-based Courses, Internships, and Industry Certifications

Union Career Connect

- Launched in 2014-15 at Union High School
- Designed to expose students to high demand career opportunities during the school day through specific coursework and "on the job" learning opportunities
- Utilizes a "learn and earn" philosophy; some companies offer paid internships during the second semester and full time employment (with benefits and tuition reimbursement) upon graduation
- Students earned nationally-recognized certifications, such as WorkKeys (reading/math/locating information), Manufacturing, Total Quality, Safety, Maintenance, OSHA 30, CPR, Child Development Associate, Fire Safety, and many Ford/Fleet automotive tech certifications

Union Career Connect

High school students attend classes in industry-based settings and earn nationally-recognized certifications prior to graduation.
